### PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with information on the 2023 fourth quarter activities for the Fire Department of North Huron.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The Fire Department produces quarterly reports for Council that provide information and statistics on staffing levels, incident response, response times, significant incidents, fire prevention activities, public fire and life safety education activities and training initiatives.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

This report reviews current staffing levels, incident response, response times, significant incidents, fire prevention activities, public fire and life safety education activities and training initiatives.

#### **Staffing Levels**



Total incidents in Q1 2023 is 35 which is below the 3-year average of 40 in the same time period. Total incidents in Q2 2023 is 63 which is above the 3-year average of 43 in the same time period. Total incidents in Q3 2023 is 57 which is above the 3-year average of 49 in the same time period. Total incidents in Q4 2023 is 46 which is below the 3-year average of 52 in the same time period. Total incidents in 2023 is 201 which is above the 3-year average of 186 in the same time period.


## Significant Incidents:


- On October 9<sup>th</sup>, 2023 FDNH responded to a structure fire on Scott Street in North Huron. 27 personnel from the Wingham and Blyth stations responded with 5 apparatus.
- On October 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2023 FDNH responded to a structure fire on Patrick Street in North Huron.
   27 personnel from the Wingham and Blyth stations responded with 5 apparatus.
- On November 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2023 FDNH responded to a structure fire on Catherine Street in North Huron. 24 personnel from the Wingham and Blyth stations responded with 7 apparatus.
- On November 6<sup>th</sup>, 2023 FDNH responded at the request of Howick Fire Department to provide mutual aid at a structure fire on Orange Hill Road in Howick Township. 21 personnel from the Wingham and Blyth Stations responded with 7 apparatus. Mutual Aid was provided from Howick Fire Department and Huron East Fire Department (Brussels Station).
- On December 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023 FDNH responded to a structure fire on Glenannon Road in Morris-Turnberry. 26 personnel responded from the Wingham and Blyth Stations with 8 apparatus. Mutual Aid was provided from Howick Fire Department, South Bruce Fire Department (Teeswater Station), Huron Kinloss Fire Department (Lucknow Station) and Huron East Fire Department (Brussels Station). During the initial response to this incident Engine One from the Wingham Station was involved in an accident.
- On December 28<sup>th</sup>, 2023 FDNH responded at the request of Goderich Fire Department to provide mutual aid at a structure fire on Sharpes Creek Line in Ashfield-Colborne-Wawanosh. 24 personnel responded from the Wingham and Blyth Stations with 3 apparatus.

## Public Fire and Life Safety Education Activities

In the fourth quarter of 2023, FDNH attended the following Public Fire and Life Safety Education activities:

- October 8-14 Fire Prevention Week 2023 "Cooking safety starts with YOU." FDNH personnel hung posters in local businesses as well as signs at the Blyth Fire Station and North Huron Wescast Community Complex.
- October 11 *Early Years group Blyth* FDNH personnel hosted a station tour and information session at the Blyth Fire Station.
- October 12 *Fire Prevention Week Open House* FDNH personnel hosted Fire Prevention Week open houses at both the Blyth and Wingham Fire Stations. Firefighters had the opportunity at this event to hand out fire safety information to public of all ages.
- October 15 *Wingham Firefighters Association fish fry* FDNH personnel attended this event to hand out fire safety information to public of all ages.
- October 27 *Wingham Witches Walk* FDNH personnel attended this event to hand out fire safety information to public of all ages.
- October 31 *Halloween* FDNH personnel handed out candy and fire safety information during Halloween at the Wingham Station.

December 12-24 – 12 Days of Holiday Fire Safety – FDNH personnel posted holiday fire safety
messaging as part of a provincial fire service effort to reach as many people as possible with
consistent messaging leading into the holidays.

In the fourth quarter of 2023, FDNH created 38 social media posts and generated the following interactions:

# **Other Notable Projects**

The Wingham Fire Station bathroom renovations were commenced in Q3 of 2023 and will be completed in Q1 2024.

FDNH completed the final steps of researching Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus equipment prior to commencing the procurement process. The research process ensures that adequate education and information is gathered prior to making this significant purchase. This purchase has a large financial impact. Procurement award is expected in Q1 2024.

Emergency Management Group has begun the Community Risk Assessment within North Huron and is currently in the data collection stage of the project. The process is expected to be completed in Q2 2024.

Fire department leadership is working closely with our insurance company and service suppliers to find a resolution for Engine One that was damaged in December. Communication is ongoing and no timeline is available at this point.
